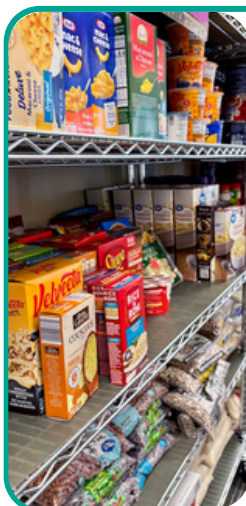

MISSION MOMENT

When federal SNAP benefits were paused last year, many families in our community were suddenly left wondering how they would put food on the table. Through Cheryl's Kitchen, the YMCA stepped in to help fill the gap. Families visited Y food pantries to receive shelf-stable groceries and, when available, fresh produce and frozen meat - simple items that made an overwhelming moment feel manageable again. Around the holidays, the Y went even further, hosting pop-up grocery giveaways to ensure more families could gather around a full table.
